

REVIEW AND ANALYSIS OF DATA SOURCES ON FEDERAL SPENDING IN ALASKA

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1. CONSOLIDATED FEDERAL FUNDS REPORT—TOTAL SPENDING

Official information on federal funds flowing to Alaska is currently available through federal fiscal year 2005 (October 2004 thru September 2005).

The \$9.2 billion flowing into Alaska in 2005 can be divided into three categories to see where growth has come from in recent years, and to better understand what the future pattern may be. (The flow of dollars is an approximation of the economic impact of the federal government on the state. We exclude the value of loans, some types of subsidies—like bypass mail, the effect of federal taxes, federal laws and regulations effecting economic activity, etc.)

“Direct Payments” are also known as Transfers. “Departments” is the sum of wages and procurement.

The total flow has increased considerably in all categories but for thinking about what the future might hold, it is the flows of GRANTS and DEPARTMENT funding that are most important.

DIRECT PAYMENTS consists largely of formula driven programs like social security, Medicare, and federal retirement that depend on national formulas and the eligible resident population. A change in the congressional delegation is unlikely to impact the level of funding of those programs. However some DIRECT PAYMENTS go to support Alaska Native tribal activities. Approximately \$100 million in this category could be vulnerable. (The largest category is Tribal Self Governance support, which was \$91 million in 2005.)

DEPARTMENT spending consists of compensation of federal employees and procurement—both operational expenditures and capital spending.

DEFENSE spending has grown dramatically, particularly between 2004 and 2005, and this has come mostly from an increase in procurement which can be traced to construction of military facilities in the state. (Personnel levels have also grown in response to the Iraqi war.)

The big bubble in military construction spending is not sustainable and is working its way thru the economy. The annual ISER Construction Forecast estimated an increase of 8% in military construction spending (cash hitting the street rather than appropriated) in 2006 followed by a 22% decline in 2007. Absent any changes in the number of military personnel or the number of active military bases in the state, it seems that DEFENSE spending for construction must fall in future years.

A change in the congressional delegation would likely result in a further drop in DEFENSE construction spending, and could possibly renew the call for base consolidation (Eielson narrowly escaped closure in the final round of BRAC). The base closures in the early 1990s (Adak and King Salmon) slowed the economy for some time.

NON DEFENSE DEPARTMENT Federal spending in Alaska is about 1/3 the size of current DEFENSE spending. It has increased more modestly than DEFENSE spending and most of that increase has been in the procurement budget for these agencies. The total procurement budget for these agencies however is only 1/4 as large as DEFENSE procurement in 2005.

Civilian agency spending is concentrated in 6 departments. Perhaps \$100 million of the procurement budget for these agencies is vulnerable to a change in the congressional delegation. The wages component of agency spending is unlikely to be vulnerable.

The number and dollar value of GRANTS (block, formula, project and cooperative agreements) to state and local government grew rapidly before 2002 and has now plateaued. The dollar value of GRANTS is not likely to grow much in the next few years and is more likely to decline.

The largest 13 programs account for 2/3 of dollars spent, and literally hundreds of other programs account for the other 1/3.

The largest programs fund medical services, construction of infrastructure, and assistance to Alaska Natives. (The program descriptions in the Consolidated Federal Funds database are not always very informative.)

Many of the largest programs, like Medicaid, TANF, and highway funding, distribute money to all states under formulas, but Alaska has special provisions which increase our share. Others are unique to Alaska (Denali Commission) or specific projects (many smaller programs). Both the special provisions of formula programs and many specific projects are vulnerable to a change in the congressional delegation.

About 65% of grants to Alaska in 2002 were either program grants or mixed (a combination of program and formula grants), and it is these categories that have been growing most rapidly. In 1997, at the start of the recent acceleration in spending, project grants per capita in Alaska were 3.9 times the US average, and by 2002 they had increased to 6.9 times the US average. The actual change (in 2002 \$) was \$1,431 per capita in Alaska compared to \$100 per capita for the US as a whole.

If per capita formula grants had grown in Alaska at the same rate as the US average during this period, they would have been \$1,041 lower than they actually were, and if they had grown by the same per capita amount, they would have been \$1,331 lower. Total per capita grants would have been \$1,588 lower if they had grown in Alaska at the same rate as the US average, and \$2,034 lower if they had grown by the same amount.

Tightening of the federal budget is likely to negatively impact program GRANTS, and to a lesser extent formula grants in Alaska.

2. CONSOLIDATED FEDERAL FUNDS REPORT—PER CAPITA SPENDING

Since at least 1999 Alaska has ranked at the top among the states in per capita federal funding. Alaska's ranking is only low for transfers, largely due to the young average age of the population.

Federal spending in Alaska per capita has increased from 30% above the national average in 1995 to 80% above in 2005. The differential is most pronounced for the Department of Defense.

3. FEDERAL ASSISTANCE AWARD DATA SYSTEM

Grants actually spent in Alaska, as well as direct assistance, took a jump in fiscal year 2001 (October 2000 to September 2001) and another larger jump in 2002. Since then the level has been relatively constant. This is the most current source of information we have on the grant portion of federal funds that “hits the street” in the state, but the shares reported in each quarter varies from year to year so it is not possible to use data reported from the early quarters to get a good estimate for the entire year. (The definitions of the types of grants reported by the Federal Assistance Awards Data System—FAADS—are not the same as the Consolidated Federal Funds Report, so it is the total, rather than specific categories, that is most useful.)

4. FEDERAL PROCUREMENT REPORT

Because of definitional differences, the procurement spending reported in the Federal Procurement Data System is somewhat different than the Consolidated Federal Funds Report, but the general trend in the two data series is consistent.

The Defense Department is consistently the largest department in Alaska—accounting for 82% of procurement spending in 2005. Spending by other departments varies considerably from year to year, with Interior, Homeland Security, GSA, and Commerce being the largest in 2005.

5. BUDGET OF THE US, OFFICE OF MANAGEMENT AND BUDGET

The federal budget, published by the Office of Management and Budget (OMB), reports total actual, obligated, and estimated grants by state each year. The level of estimated grants provides a forecast for the coming fiscal year, but unfortunately most grant programs are not included in the OMB total. The actual OMB reported total for Alaska in 2005 was \$1.634 billion. However grants reported in the more comprehensive Consolidated Federal Funds Report totaled \$3.131 billion. Missing from the OMB report are many of the large grant programs targeting the Alaska Native population as well as many grant programs that could be judged most vulnerable in the event of a tightening of the federal budget. Consequently, although this data source provides useful and up-to-date information on most of the larger federal programs, because it is not comprehensive, it cannot be used to estimate or forecast the aggregate level of grants Alaska receives or could expect to receive in the future.

6. PIG BOOK

One estimate of Alaska’s vulnerability from a concerted effort to eliminate perceived waste in federal spending comes from the “Pig Book”, an annual compilation of “pork barrel” projects published by a nonprofit organization called Citizens Against Government Waste (CAGW). (Some of these projects would be classified as grants and others as procurement.) Per capita “Pork” has increased dramatically in Alaska while remaining relatively constant for the US as a whole.

This compilation provides one perspective on how some Alaska projects are viewed by critics outside the state. CAGW defines a "pork" project as a line-item in an appropriations bill that designates tax dollars for a specific purpose in circumvention of established budgetary procedures. To qualify as pork, a project must meet one of the following seven criteria:

- Requested by only one chamber of Congress;
- Not specifically authorized;
- Not competitively awarded;
- Not requested by the President;
- Greatly exceeds the President’s budget request or the previous year’s funding;
- Not the subject of congressional hearings; or
- Serves only a local or special interest.

Some examples of items on the CAGW list for Alaska in 2006 are shown below. It is clear that the authors of the study have a limited understanding of Alaska and Alaska needs, but the list

does demonstrate that advocating for those needs is a constant challenge. A change in the congressional delegation could make it more difficult to meet those needs.

7. EARMARKS

The US Office of Management and Budget has compiled a list of \$19 billion worth of earmarks in the 2005 federal budget (appropriations) for the purpose of using it as a base to reduce the number and amount by half in future years. An earmark is defined as a project or program where the congressional direction circumvents the merit-based or competitive allocation process, or specifies the location or recipient, or otherwise curtails the ability of the Executive Branch to properly manage funds. Congress includes earmarks in appropriation bills—the annual spending bills that Congress enacts to allocate discretionary spending—and also in authorization bills.

Alaska led the nation in the per capita value of earmarks in 2005 at \$1,013. The US average was about \$63. For Alaska the total earmark amount was \$691 million.

With 353 earmarks identified, Alaska ranked 10th in the nation in number of earmarks.

8. PUBLIC CONSTRUCTION SPENDING

Since most public construction in Alaska is financed by the federal government, annual public construction spending provides some indication of the magnitude of federal construction grants and procurement for construction projects. The annual ISER construction spending forecast shows a large jump in total public construction spending in 2006 followed by a slight decline in 2007. A portion of the 2006 jump and strength of the 2007 spending excluding defense results from an increase in the general fund portion of the state capital budget as well as the funding of state projects by bonds so it is not correct to infer from this projection that federal non defense construction spending has increased in the last two years. Federal defense spending on construction did increase through 2006, but fell in 2007.

9. STATE OPERATING AND CAPITAL BUDGETS

State government is the recipient of most of the formula grants coming to Alaska (94% in 2002). Furthermore the state government receives only a small portion of the project grants (20% in 2002) with the majority going to tribes (42%), other nonprofits (15%), and local governments and school districts (15%). Since Federal grants make up the largest share of the state capital budget, the projected state budget provides some indication of the level and direction of change of formula grants, but not project grants or the other components of federal spending in the state. Unfortunately the state budget must be prepared prior to the start of the federal fiscal year, so the enacted totals are estimates of money the state might receive. Consequently they do not provide the basis for a good projection of formula grant spending.
